Technical vs. Adaptive Challenges

Technical vs. Adaptive Challenges

Technical Challenge

 Technical challenges may be very complex and critically important, but they have known solutions that can be implemented by current knowhow. They don't require much learning to define the problem or to solve it, just the will and capacity to execute.

Adaptive Challenge

 Adaptive challenges require learning in order to both define the problem and to find a solution. They can only be addressed through changes in people's priorities, habits, and loyalties. Making progress often requires shedding old beliefs or ways of doing something.



We often think policy change is purely technical, but it's not.



Where are technical challenges showing up? Where are adaptive challenges showing up?



Identifying Technical vs. Adaptive Challenges

How It Works

- 1. In pairs, you'll have a Presenter group and Listener group.
- 2. Presenters will have **8 minutes** to share their policy challenge. During that time, Listeners will use the worksheet to note where technical challenges and/or adaptive challenges are showing up.
- 3. Listeners will have **5 minutes** to share their takeaways and observations with the Presenters.
- 4. The group will then have **5 minutes** to debrief together.
- 5. Switch Presenter and Listener groups, and repeat.


