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

New 10-Minute Walk Policy Report – Coming Soon!



Growth is outpacing park development.

• **65**% of the 100 most populous U.S. cities had less park space per person in 2024 than in 2016.

Private development is a key driver of new park creation.

- 67% of recent park and greenway openings across 10 representative U.S. cities were established on land provided by real estate developers or funded by development fees.
- 62% of these parks were constructed by the developer or a private entity.

Cities need better models.

 40% of city staff surveyed were dissatisfied with their city's park dedication and impact fee policies.
