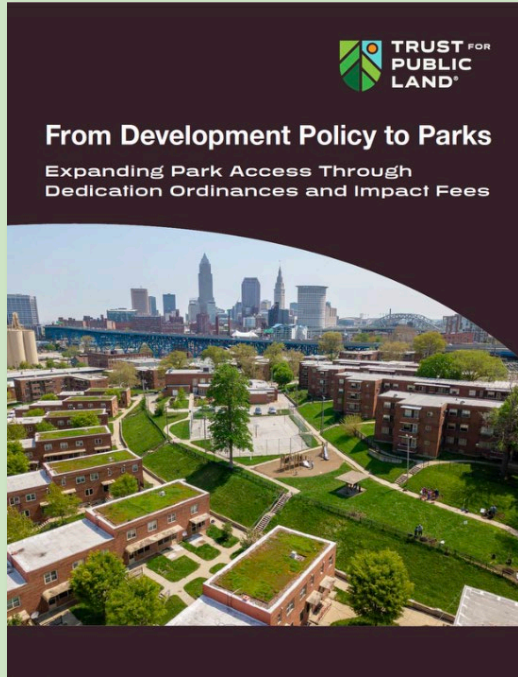

New 10-Minute Walk Policy Report – Coming Soon!



Growth is outpacing park development.

- **65%** of the 100 most populous U.S. cities had less park space per person in 2024 than in 2016.

Private development is a key driver of new park creation.

- **67%** of recent park and greenway openings across 10 representative U.S. cities were established on land provided by real estate developers or funded by development fees.
- **62%** of these parks were constructed by the developer or a private entity.

Cities need better models.

- **40%** of city staff surveyed were dissatisfied with their city's park dedication and impact fee policies.

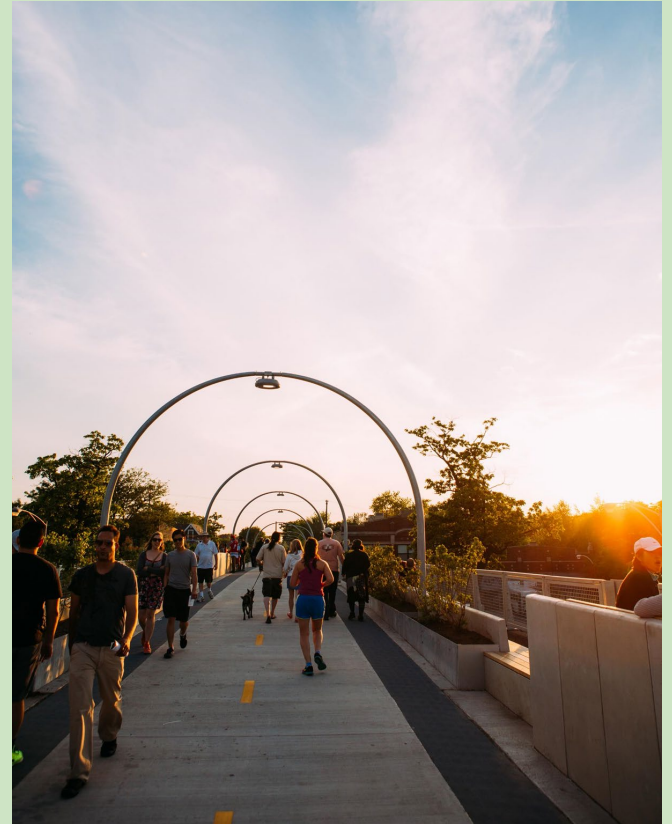
