Today, 100 million people across the U.S, including 28 million kids, don't have a park within a 10-minute walk of home.






# 10-Minute Walk® Mission: Closing the Park Equity Gap


Despite the vital role parks play in the success of our cities and quality of life, we have a detrimental **Park Equity Divide** across the U.S.

**1 in 3** U.S. residents – including almost **40% of children** – lack access to close-to-home parks.

Back of the envelope, **over 20,000 new parks are needed**, just to fill the access gap. This need increases significantly when factoring in accessibility, quality, and use.








#### Digging into "Park Equity" – neighborhood assets










Figure 7 - Somple Supply and Demand Analysis with resulting Lower Level of Service Map.


Land Type	Benefits
Schoolyards	<ul> <li>May have existing park-like infrastructure</li> <li>Direct access for youth</li> </ul>
Public Libraries	<ul> <li>Opportunities for educational &amp; other services</li> <li>Existing public access and programming</li> </ul>
Public Housing	<ul> <li>Direct access for residents; builds community ownership</li> <li>Supports holistic community development</li> </ul>
Utility Land	<ul> <li>Corridors can support light trail &amp; greenway connectivity</li> <li>Limitations on development &amp; use can support habitat development &amp; conservation goals</li> </ul>
Rights-of-Way	<ul> <li>Supports multi-modal transportation goals</li> <li>Increase connectivity to and between parks</li> </ul>
Public Cemeteries	<ul> <li>Maintained as passive park-like spaces</li> <li>Opportunities for educational programming</li> </ul>
Public Buildings	<ul> <li>Footprint already publicly owned</li> <li>Foster sense of welcoming and civic engagement</li> </ul>
Other	<ul> <li>Vacant lands, existing naturalized lands, and other under-utilized lands in your area may be able to address local park equity goals.</li> </ul>

Transform Lands	<ul><li>Vacant lots</li><li>Brownfields</li><li>Parking lots</li></ul>
Greening Corridors	<ul> <li>Light trail and greenway connectivity</li> <li>Rights of way</li> <li>Transit stations and stops</li> </ul>
Temporary Activations	<ul><li>Open streets</li><li>Pop-up parklets</li></ul>
Multi-use for passive experiences	Public cemeteries
Public Private Partnerships	<ul><li>Privately Owned Public Spaces (POPs)</li><li>Plazas</li></ul>

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
